It may feel like we are living in uniquely challenging financial times, but there is rich comfort to be had in realizing that our spiritual ancestors wrestled with many of the same issues and concerns. Thankfully, they have left us a treasure trove of wisdom about how to not only serve God with our finances, but to find true contentment as well. WEEK 1-STEWARDSHIP

OVERVIEW

At the very beginning of the biblical narrative, God places the human in the garden "to tend and watch over it." This role, as a steward of God's good creation, becomes a fundamental image of humanity's place in this world throughout the Bible, and it plays a major role in the biblical conception of wealth and possessions. To the biblical authors, the things we own are not actually ours at all; they're God's. We are simply stewards, and it is our responsibility to ensure that our resources are being used for the things he cares about, instead of merely using them for our own interests.

In a time of financial anxiety and ruthless self-sufficiency, this is no easy task. Stewardship is not a guilt trip to give more away, but a call to surrender control to God and trust that he will give us more than enough to not only lead to our own flourishing, but to heal this broken world as well.
